Structure, governance and management

The Parochial Church Council is a corporate body, established by the Church of England. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council (Powers) Measure. The PCC is registered with the Charity Commissioners (no. 1141709).

PCC Members are also Charity Trustees and must ensure compliance with charity law and church (ecclesiastical) law and exercise a duty of prudence and a duty of care.

The method and appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All regular church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and are thereby eligible to stand for election to the PCC. In 2009 the Annual Parochial Church Meeting agreed to electing 12 members for 3 year terms of office with casual vacancies filled by those with least votes and to suspend until rescinded, the 6-year rule for the term of office of a Churchwarden.

The PCC continues to comply with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have due regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).

Other matters related to church and other legislation (compliance with Health and Safety and Disability Discrimination etc.) are brought to the notice of PCC members for review and action.

Committees

The Standing Committee is a statutory requirement and comprises the Vicar, Churchwardens, Treasurer, PCC Secretary and at least two, but no more than four, elected members from the PCC. This Committee meets, when required, and brings recommendations to PCC meetings on various matters, including those referred to it by the Council. It has power to take decisions on behalf of the PCC when required.

Other committees or Task Groups are formed and meet as required to consider various aspects of church life.

We also have, with formal terms of reference, task groups for Property, Finance, HR and Pre-School Management. It is our intention that all members of the PCC sit on at least one of these groups and the clergy are members of each group by right. The task groups meet three times a year following shorter PCC meetings and on an ad-hoc basis as required.

St Mary's Island District Church Council operates with separate accounts and meetings under the leadership of the Vicar and the Focal Minister (lay position). Their annual reports are published and sent to the Diocese separately but we include them together with this report in our Charity Commission submission. St Mary's Island has its own District Council Scheme (i.e. its 'constitution') approved by Bishop's Council and the Diocesan Registrar.

Objectives and Activities

The role of the PCC is:

To promote the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England and upholding the evangelical charismatic tradition of St Mark's.

To co-operate with the minister in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. To accomplish this, we seek together through prayer to discern 'the mind of the Lord'.

To take responsibility for the right administration of the Church and its properties and, in conjunction with the Churchwardens and Treasurer, to make financial provision for staff salaries, Parish 'Offer' (Share), general maintenance and running costs as well as the various charitable needs.

To make considered decisions, after discussion and prayer, on behalf of the whole Church fellowship rather than simply promoting members' individual or partisan interests. In the planning of activities, the PCC has considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

The Church's Purpose Statement is 'Living for Jesus, Loving Gillingham and Learning Together' which was adopted by the PCC in September 2016.

Church Attendance

On the Church Electoral Roll, as at 31 Dec 2016, there were 182 members, plus a further 64 on the Electoral Roll of St. Mary's Island Church.

The weekly attendance at the Sunday Church services at St Mark's averaged 155 over 16 year olds and 40 under 16's. The adult number is a healthy increase over 2016.

The attendance at major events was as follows:

237 at the Easter Day service
161 at the Christmas Eve service
198 at the Christmas Day service
494 at the Remembrance Day service

A number of children and young people met regularly with their leaders on Sundays and at various activities during the week.

In October, a detailed study was carried out on Church attendance during the month. The statistics showed:

Note that the above numbers do not account for SPLAT!@St Mark's as these are Saturday events, but the attendance at these events continued to attract large numbers.

The PCC will continue to use the full data to focus ministry accordingly and track trends in the future.

PCC

During the year, the PCC met monthly except for April, August and December. The Council remain focused on proper governance of our Church but we have increasingly used the meeting time to ensure that we spend good time praying and seeking to discern the way forward that God has in store for us. Details of the activity are covered in the more specific report of the PCC by our excellent PCC secretary, Becky England. Becky will be standing down after the APCM and I would like to register and note my sincere thanks for her diligent and professional service that she has provided over many years.

Church Status

Regrettably, the Church remains in a status where the living is suspended. The shadow of closure over St. Barnabas remains but there are signs of growth and life which encourage us that this body are recovering. Until final decisions on deanery structure are made then sadly the living will remain suspended.

Staff and elected roles

Richard, Kathryn and the girls left in May 2016 to take up the role as Vicar of Crofton Parish.

Deano Standing was elected as Churchwarden for his third term and Terry Whittaker was re-elected to serve his eleventh term.

Lynne Martin continued her role as Students and Internationals Co-ordinator.

In the office, we continue to be grateful to Pauline Jackson for her ongoing role as Office Manager and to Jo Whittaker for her support of me in my PA role.

Building Issues

The Fabrics, Goods and Ornaments report fully details all that has happened relative to our properties (see statutory and additional reports booklet).

Church Activities

Many of our activities continue but new for 2016 were the Eritrean Church and the jointly run Winter Night Shelter with local churches in Medway.

A couple of areas of ministry ceased during the year – SPLAT! Holiday Club and the CAP Money Course. Whilst at first glance this appears alarming as each of the Ministries provided massive value and evidenced Godly commitment, we are confident that these changes all form part of the transition that is underway at St. Mark's. It is not to say that these Ministries will not reappear in a new or different form; that is part of our listening and exploring which we are now engaged in. A huge thank you to all of those who served in the various different areas.

The MAP (Mission Action Plan) group were formed and very active in 2016. A full report of their activity is included in the main body of reports but I just wanted to recognise the importance of our engagement and how it is shaping our transformation into what we believe God is calling us to. My thanks in particular to Chris Atkins who chaired this as well as each member of the team.

St Mark's Parish - St Mary's Island Church (SMIC)

The full report of the activity of SMI Church is covered in a specific report within the additional reports booklet but, in summary, the Church is making good progress as it reaches out to the community. In March, Ernie Mann stepped down as leader of the Church, a decision which created both a great opportunity to recognise all that Ernie has done to lead the Church and also to explore what God has in store for the Church, settled in the heart of the Island. John Bloor is appointed as the focal lay leader of the Church. The Island church is in the process of shaping its purpose statement.

St Mary's Island C of E School

The school flourishes under the headship of Christine Easton. The school was categorised as good by Ofsted in 2014 but in 2016 the SIAMS (National Society for the Inspection of Anglican & Methodist Schools) agency upgraded their rating from good to outstanding. Christine and the whole team should be congratulated at this fantastic achievement. Christine affords us a great welcome and the ability to witness to the children, staff and parents. We thank Carolyn Facey for her daily commitment to the school.

Financial review

General Fund

At the beginning of 2016, we forecast a budget deficit on unrestricted General Fund of £19,506. We give thanks to God that at the year-end we finished with a surplus, after transfers between funds, of £4,117. Our total voluntary income was £159,271 compared to £151,584 in 2015 and our total income was £167,604 with expenditure rising from £154,774 to £161,664.

We are so grateful for the sacrificial giving of so many in continued difficult financial times.

Staff and expenses costs were approximately £10,000 lower than budget, because of not yet appointing the Head of Youth, Children and Families.

Away Giving was £13,159 which was not quite our budgeted tithe. The balance between that and our budget was transferred into the Mission Fund for distribution in 2017. We paid £68,000 to the Diocese of Rochester under the 'Offer' system and donated a further £2,000 to them at the end of the year earmarked for Mission.

The General Fund cash at bank and in hand at 31 December 2016 was £37,241. After debtors and creditors adjustment the net current asset at 31 December 2016 was £44,521.

Other Funds

The total year-end balance in our Repair Funds was £28,072. During the year, we deposited £5,025 but had significant outlay, primarily associated with the cost of repairs to the Church roof.

The Development Fund has a balance of £70,700 after expenditure on Architects fees and it is from this fund that we will be paying the cost of the works on the new accessible toilets. The balance in the Mission Fund was £5,006. We are grateful to those who faithfully give regularly to these two funds.

The Vicar's Discretionary Fund balance is £1,646 after discretionary giving of £352.

Pre-School income from all sources was £57,985 and expenditure £61,467, giving a net deficit of £3,482. This compares to a net deficit of 6,749 in 2015. The fund balance is £19,114.

Budget

The PCC approved the 2017 budget at £184,339, with a small year-end forecast deficit of £339, which includes provision for a Head of Youth, Children and Families Ministry from April 2017.

Summary

Last year I learnt a new word - sesquicentennial. My dictionary tells me that it is an adjective marking the completion of a period of 150 years. God indeed has been faithful to us as a church for the last 150 years even as we marked, celebrated and gave thanks for God's goodness, amidst the various social and demographic changes. We thank God constantly for his provision, the generosity of members of the congregation that give sacrificially of their time and money, and for the grace of God that has enabled us all to work together harmoniously.

Our witness as a Church community is best served by the way we welcome, we serve and we love. This report, and the Statutory and Additional Reports in a separate publication, show how much our congregation is committed to blessing our local neighbourhood which suffers, like other deprived areas, from the injustices and inequalities in society. I am particularly encouraged by the way we, as the church, participated in the process of writing our MAP by deliberately listening to God, to each other and to our community.

Of course, not everything is recorded and I am grateful for everyone's contributions whether they are written down or not. There are so many people engaged in serving the Church in large ways and small, visible and often invisible - and I express my thanks for all those people who do so much in the life of the Church and parish. It is so important to remember God's wonderful faithfulness as we look back over the last 150 years and to continue to trust Him as we look forward to the years ahead, whatever that might hold for us.

I consider leading St. Mark's as one of the greatest privileges of my life. Our purpose as a church that of, 'living for Jesus, loving Gillingham & learning together' is an inspiration to me in my discipleship. I delight in the fact that the person of Jesus is right at the heart of our church. What we believe about him ultimately shapes what we believe about the church and what we believe about his mission in the world.

For all that has gone in the past and for all that is to come, our hearts sing, Hallelujah.

Independent Examiner's Report to the PCC of St Mark's Church, Gillingham

This Report on the accounts of the PCC for the year ended 31 December 2016, which are set out in this Annual Report, is in respect of an examination carried out under Regulation 3(3) of the Church Accounting Regulations ("the Regulations") and s.145 of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Act").

Respective responsibilities of the PCC and the examiner

As the members of the PCC you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts; you consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 3(3) and section 144(2) of the Act do not apply. It is my responsibility to issue this Report on those accounts in accordance with the Regulations.

Basis of this Report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the Act and to be found in the Church accounting guidance, issued by the Archbishop's Council. That examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the PCC and a comparison of the accounts with those records. It also includes considering any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Independent Examiner's statement

In connection with my examination, no matter has come to my attention:

- (1) which gives me reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect the requirements
 - to keep accounting records in accordance with section 130 of the Act; and
 - to prepare accounts which accord with the accounting records and comply with the requirements of the Act and the Regulations have not been met; or
- (2) to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.

Accounting policies

Basis of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 in accordance with the applicable accounting standards and the current Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of the Garden House. The financial statements include transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of informal gatherings of church members.

Funds

The General Fund represents the funds of the PCC that are unrestricted and are available for application to the general purpose of the PCC. Other Funds are restricted, including the Development Fund, Mission Fund, Vicar's Discretionary Fund, Playgroup Fund, Small Funds, Repair Fund and Head of Youth, Children and Families funds.

The Development Fund represents monies donated for capital/refurbishment work on all church properties, receives gift aid and other income from donors.

The Mission Fund is a fund into which donations given by church members specifically for mission work are held and distributed.

The Vicar's Discretionary Fund is financed primarily from voluntary donations and makes discretionary payments to those in need.

The Pre-school is self-financing, providing a Christian pre-school for the local community.

A number of accounts have been entered collectively under the heading of Small Funds, where restricted income has been received for specific purposes.

The Repair Funds are amounts held by the Diocese of Rochester on St Mark's behalf to cover the cost of anticipated repair work on the Church, Old Vicarage, Vicarage Hall and Garden House.

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income and capital resources

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC.
Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised only when received.

Income tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is recognised when the income is received.

Other income

Rental income from letting of church property is recognised when the rental is due.

Fixed Assets

Consecrated and benefice property is not included in the accounts in accordance with s.10(2)(a) and (c) of the Charities Act 2011.

All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or beneficed buildings, individual item under £1,000 of the repair of movable church furnishings acquired before 01 January 2000 is written off.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Depreciation on fixed asset properties has not been provided in these accounts as any charge is considered to be not material, on the basis that the asset has either a very long useful life; or a residual value, based on its current value, which is not materially different from its carrying value. Depreciation is provided on all other tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, over the expected useful lives of the assets, as follows:

Equipment (sound desk) is being written down by 20% of cost per annum.
